The Relation of Detail to Totals in the Data Tabulation

The sum of the industries in a sector, subsector, or industry group may not equal the total for the sector, subsector, or industry group. The industry classifications of some establishments in the Business Register are not available because the Census Bureau receives reports for new establishments, but it does not receive the information needed to classify them at the detailed industry level. Data for these establishments may be included in the totals for the sector, subsector, or industry group.

In addition, for tables that show data by detailed industry for each state and for tables that show selected county by industry and selected county by state and industry data, data cells with a small number of employees were not presented in order to save space. The threshold number of employees for these tables is given below:

1. The threshold does not apply to two-digit NAICS sectors; all sector totals are shown in these tables.

2. The threshold does not apply to "Total Manufacturing", which is always shown.

3. The threshold applies only to six-digit industries; all other industry subtotals are shown.

Statistics for an industry are included in the total for the sector, subsector, or industry group to which that industry belongs.

For data on all U.S. establishments, the total shown for the United States may not equal the sum of the totals for the individual states because the total for the United States and the totals for the states are based on different sources of data.
