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

REVISIONS in the preliminary (15-day) estimates of total GNP were minor (table 1). An upward revision in the change in business inventories was offset by downward revisions in all components of final sales except fixed investment. The increase in GNP prices as measured by the fixed-weighted and chain price indexes was revised downward slightly. The 45-day estimate continues to show that real GNP was about unchanged in the first quarter (chart 1), and last month's assessment that the severe weather and the coal strike held down the change in real GNP by as much as 3 percentage points continues to hold.

Corporate profits.—First-quarter corporate profits from current production—profits with inventory valuation and capital consumption adjustments—fell at an annual rate of \$18 billion, according to preliminary estimates. They had decreased \$4 billion in the fourth quarter. At \$127 billion, profits were only slightly higher than in the first quarter of 1977. Before-tax profits with inventory valuation adjustment fell \$17 billion (annual rate), following a \$3 billion decrease in the fourth quarter. The fall was more than accounted for by domestic profits of non-financial corporations, which fell \$20 billion following a \$1 billion decrease. The severe weather, the coal mining strike, and coal and electricity shortages caused by the strike accounted for about one-half of the fall. Industries most affected by these factors were coal mining, railroad transportation, electric utilities, petroleum and coal products, and primary metals manufacturing. Profit declines in other manufacturing industries, although generally smaller, were widespread.

Before-tax book profits declined \$6 billion (annual rate), following an in-

crease of \$5½ billion in the fourth quarter. These profits exclude the two valuation adjustments. These adjustments are made largely in order to value inventories and fixed capital used up in production at replacement cost, which is the valuation procedure underlying national income and product accounting, rather than at historical cost, which is the procedure generally underlying business accounting. If, as in the first quarter, the historical cost of inventories used up falls short of their replacement cost, profits as measured by business exceed profits as measured in the NIPA's by an amount that is called inventory profits. Reflecting widespread acceleration in prices, inventory profits increased \$11 billion in the first quarter, to \$25 billion, following an increase of \$8 billion in the fourth quarter.

Corporate profits taxes, which are levied on profits including inventory profits, decreased \$4 billion, following an increase of about the same size in the fourth quarter.

Federal sector in the first quarter

Federal receipts increased more than expenditures in the first quarter, and the deficit as measured in the national income and product accounts declined to about \$56 billion (annual rate).

The \$9 billion (annual rate) increase in receipts was more than accounted for by contributions for social insurance. Their large increase—\$11 billion—reflects (1) increases in the social security tax rate from 11.7 to 12.1 percent (\$3.4 billion) and in the taxable wage base from \$16,500 to \$17,700 (\$2.3 billion), and (2) an increase in the State unemployment insurance tax base from \$4,200 to \$6,000 (\$1.5

billion). Other increases in first-quarter receipts occurred in indirect business tax and nontax accruals and in personal tax and nontax receipts. The increase in indirect business tax was in customs duties, which reflected a rebound of nonpetroleum imports after the fourth-quarter dock strike. The increase in personal taxes was held down largely because of heavy refunds resulting from the Tax Reduction and Simplification Act of 1977. Under the Act, Federal income tax withholdings were reduced June 1, 1977, to reflect a higher standard deduction, but liabilities had been reduced effective January 1. Corporate profits tax accruals declined

in the first quarter, reflecting a large decline in profits before tax.

The \$4.5 billion (annual rate) expenditure increase was held down by large declines in subsidies less the current surplus of government enterprises and nondefense purchases. The decline in the former was mainly traceable to agricultural subsidies, and the decline in the latter to agricultural purchases by the Commodity Credit Corporation. Grants-in-aid to State and local governments, which had declined in the fourth quarter, recorded a strong increase; most of the increase was in grants for public assistance and local public works. Increases also occurred in transfer

payments to persons, in net interest paid, and in national defense purchases.

Special reconciliation tables

The reconciliations of changes in compensation per hour and average hourly earnings and of changes in the implicit price deflator for personal consumption expenditures (PCE) and the consumer price index (CPI) are shown in Tables 2 and 3, respectively.

Compensation per hour of all persons in the private nonfarm economy increased 11.1 percent at a seasonally adjusted annual rate in the first quarter of 1978. In contrast, average hourly

earnings or increased 9.2 percent. The difference is attributable to supplements to wages and salaries, which include employer contributions for social security and unemployment compensation. In the first quarter, the social security tax rate and taxable wage base and the unemployment insurance taxable wage base were increased.

The implicit price deflator for PCE increased 8.4 percent at a seasonally adjusted annual rate, compared with a 7.6 percent increase in both the PCE chain price index and the CPI. The major contribution to the unusually large difference between the increase in the implicit price deflator and the chain price index was a sharp increase in consumer spending for energy—electricity, gas, fuel oil, and coal. Price increases for these items have been larger than for the average of other PCE items since the base year 1972.

Unlike the increase in the chain price index, the increase in the implicit price deflator reflects not only price changes but also shifts in the composition of PCE.

Contributions to the difference between the percent change in the PCE chain price index and in the CPI were large, but offsetting. Prices for food at home, which have a larger weight in the CPI than in the chain price index, increased sharply in the first quarter, and contributed to a larger percent change in the CPI than in the chain price index. Contributions of changes in prices and differences in weights for noncomparable expenditure components were nearly offsetting. Differences in the level of detail in seasonally adjusting component price indexes caused the percent change in the CPI to be smaller than the percent change in the chain price index.

Public and Private Debt

The Bureau of Economic Analysis is discontinuing preparation of the public and private debt series, which last appeared in the July 1977 SURVEY OF CURRENT BUSINESS with estimates through 1976. The series is being discontinued because the underlying concepts and methodology needed a thorough review for which resources are not available.

The series closest in coverage to the public and private debt series is published by the Federal Reserve Board in the Flow of Funds Accounts. That series, total credit market debt outstanding of all sectors, differs from the public and private debt series in several respects. Most important, it includes foreign credit market debt owed to the United States and excludes non-credit market debt, such as trade credit and "unallocated" liabilities. The Flow of Funds outstandings data are published annually and are available from the Division of Research and Statistics, Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, Washington, D.C. 20551.

As indicated in the July 1977 Survey, the industrial classification underlying the NIPA estimates is now based on the 1972 Standard Industrial Classification (SIC), replacing the 1967 SIC. In tables 1-4, the estimates for manufacturing also are based on the 1972 SIC. The estimates for merchant wholesale and retail trade are based on the 1967 SIC.

Table 4: The weighted I-S ratios shown in this table were obtained by weighting detailed industry I-S ratios with 1972 sales. Additional industrial detail was used than is shown in table 2. For manufacturing, I-S ratios for 21 industries were weighted by sales; for merchant wholesalers, 7 categories of business, and for retail trade, 8.

Receipts and Expenditures of State Governments and of Local Governments, 1959-76

THE receipt and expenditure patterns of State governments differ from those of local governments, and accordingly separate information on these two levels of government is required for a thorough analysis of their fiscal positions. This article presents such information within the framework of the national income and product accounts (NIPA's) for the period 1959-76: The NIPA receipts and expenditures account for State and local governments is deconsolidated to provide separate accounts for the two levels of government. The new accounts also provide information for analyses of transactions between State governments and local governments and between each of the levels of government and the rest of the economy. Tables 1 and 2 provide estimates of receipts, expenditures, and the fiscal positions of State and local governments, respectively. Tables 3 and 4 supplement these tables by providing functional breakdowns of expenditures for the two levels of government.¹

BEA is preparing estimates of current-and-constant dollar purchases for each level of government for major functions and by major type of purchase: employee compensation, structures, and other purchases.

The new accounts do not provide separate information for each State or for groups of localities. The fiscal positions of the various States and localities differ, and it would be desirable, therefore, to have separate information for them. However, such information cannot be provided because the required primary data are difficult to obtain, and, even if the data could be obtained, BEA would not have sufficient resources to prepare the NIPA estimates.

Military Transactions in the U.S. International Accounts, 1972-77

TRANSFERS under U.S. military agency sales contracts, which represent primarily deliveries of goods and services to foreign governments under the foreign military sales (FMS) program, were a record \$7.1 billion in 1977, compared with \$1.2 billion in 1972. Increased deliveries of sophisticated weaponry and related services to countries in the Middle East accounted for much of the rise. Deliveries to NATO allies also increased. Until 1969, they had accounted for the major portion of FMS deliveries, but in subsequent years, their share declined sharply.

U.S. direct defense expenditures for goods and services purchased abroad by the Department of Defense and by the U.S. Coast Guard averaged \$4.8 billion annually in 1972-76, before escalating to \$5.7 billion in 1977. In 1972-76, increased outlays in Western Europe and in the Middle East offset steadily declining costs associated with the war in Southeast Asia. The \$0.8 billion increase in 1977 largely reflected higher expenditures in Germany, attributable in part to the depreciation of the U.S. dollar, and a rise in reimbursable construction activity in Saudi Arabia.

The effect of these developments on the U.S. international accounts was a shift from net payments by military agencies in 1975 and earlier years to net receipts in 1976 and 1977. Net receipts were \$0.3 billion in 1976, and \$1.3 billion in 1977 (chart 2).

U.S. Military Transfers

Transfers under U.S. military agency sales contracts consist of deliveries of goods to, and performance of services for, foreign governments by U.S. mili-

tary agencies—on a cash or credit basis—under FMS contracts, plus small amounts of non-FMS deliveries resulting from the sale of surplus property and incidental sales by U.S. military agencies. The transfers are primarily weaponry—such as fighter aircraft, missiles, and tanks—plus associated spare parts, support services, and construction (chart 3). (For a further description, see the technical note at the end of this article.)

Since 1972, participation in the FMS program has changed dramatically. Although deliveries to most countries increased from 1972 to 1977, the principal factor contributing to the sixfold rise in military transfers was the sub-

stantially increased participation of a few Middle East countries (chart 4).

Middle East


Deliveries of goods and services to Middle East countries were \$0.4 billion, or one-third of the total in 1972; by 1977 they had jumped to \$5.0 billion, or more than two-thirds of the total (table 1).

Iran was one of the major participants in the FMS program in 1977, with deliveries of \$2.0 billion, up from \$0.1 billion in 1972. A decision by the U.S. Government in 1972 to permit expanded sales of sophisticated weaponry to Iran, combined with that country's rise in oil revenues, allowed Iran to procure a wide range of advanced fighter aircraft, naval vessels, missiles, and other weapons systems. In addition, Iran contracted with the U.S. military agencies for associated services, such as training Iranian pilots and mechanics, and providing a supply system of spare parts and replacement items (engines, ammunition, etc.).



Saudi Arabia also utilized its rise in oil revenues to purchase significant amounts of goods and services through the FMS program. Unlike the 80 other participating countries, however, Saudi Arabia's purchases were not primarily for weaponry but for technical assistance and infrastructure necessary for economic and military modernization. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has assisted the Saudi Arabian Government with construction projects since the midsixties, and the desire to retain the assistance of the Corps probably was a major factor in Saudi Arabia's decision to utilize the FMS program for some of the current projects, which include construction of airfields, deep-water port facilities, roads, housing,

hospitals, and schools. As these projects advanced from the architectural and engineering stages to actual construction, deliveries of goods and services increased sharply, from less than \$0.1 billion in 1972 to \$1.8 billion in 1977. As the infrastructure is put in place, Saudi Arabia will be able to absorb increasingly sophisticated weapons systems. Saudi Arabia has already taken delivery of F-5 aircraft and military vehicles, and U.S. military agencies have conducted extensive operation and maintenance training programs for Saudi military personnel.

Deliveries to Israel in 1977 were \$0.9 billion, compared with \$0.2 billion in 1972. Deliveries surged to \$0.8 billion in 1973 as a result of the Arab-Israeli war. During the last quarter of 1973, the United States transferred significant quantities of fighter aircraft, tanks, armored personnel carriers, and ammunition in order to resupply and strengthen the Israeli armed forces. After the war, deliveries declined. Subsequently, Israel placed orders for additional fighter aircraft, tracked vehicles, and missiles, resulting in a moderate but steady growth in deliveries in the last 3 years.

Deliveries to Kuwait were \$0.1 billion in 1977, reflecting initial delivery of fighter aircraft and associated training and technical assistance. Deliveries to

Jordan were also \$0.1 billion. Currently, Jordan, with the financial assistance of Saudi Arabia, is taking delivery of an air defense system and military vehicles.



NATO Europe

From the inception of the FMS program in 1950 until 1969, deliveries to the European NATO countries accounted for more than half of the annual total. Although deliveries to these countries increased from \$0.4 billion in 1972 to \$1.0 billion in 1977, their share declined from 34 percent in 1972 to 14 percent in 1977.

The desire for standardization of weaponry within the NATO alliance has become a major factor in the procurement of military goods by NATO countries. In particular, it has led to the purchase of U.S. fighter planes, missiles, and communications equipment. The decision in 1975 by a consortium of NATO countries (Belgium, Denmark, Netherlands, and Norway) to select the U.S. Air Force's F-16 as their front-line fighter for the 1980's is the most recent example of standardization efforts.

Deliveries to Germany averaged \$0.3 billion in 1972-77. To a significant

degree, the German participation in the FMS program was the result of a series of formal "offset agreements" between the Governments of the United States and Germany. These agreements, which extended from 1961 to 1975, were designed to help offset the foreign exchange costs associated with maintaining U.S. troops in Germany. Under certain provisions of these agreements, Germany purchased U.S. missiles and fighter aircraft (the F-104 in the 1960's and the F-4 in the 1970's); deliveries were completed in 1977.

Prior to 1974, Greece and Turkey received most of their U.S. military goods and services under military grant programs. In recent years, military grant aid to these two countries was reduced in favor of credit financing under the FMS program. Deliveries financed by FMS credits to Greece were \$0.3 billion in 1977, unchanged from 1976; deliveries to Turkey were less than \$0.1 billion in both years.

Other countries

A less restrictive U.S. Government policy toward military sales to Latin America since 1972 and a more extensive use of FMS credits resulted in increased deliveries to Latin America. Deliveries, although modest in comparison with other regions, grew steadily since 1972 and consisted primarily of aircraft.

Increased use of FMS credits, following curtailment of military grant programs, resulted in higher deliveries to Korea and Taiwan in recent years. In 1977, Korea took delivery of \$0.3 billion of aircraft, missiles, and miscellaneous goods and services, and Taiwan took deliveries of \$0.1 billion.

Direct Defense Expenditures

Direct defense expenditures consist of payments for goods and services purchased abroad under all U.S. de-

fense programs by military agencies and by the U.S. Coast Guard. (For a further description, see the technical note.)


In 1977, direct defense expenditures totaled \$5.7 billion, up \$0.8 billion from 1976. The major factors were higher expenditures in Germany, attributable in part to a depreciation of the U.S. dollar against the mark, and increased reimbursable construction activity in Saudi Arabia. Direct defense expenditures averaged \$4.8 billion in 1972-76, as the reduction in outlays associated with the withdrawal of U.S. troops from Southeast Asia following the Vietnam war was offset by increased outlays in Germany and in Saudi Arabia.

Worldwide direct expenditures by Department of Defense military and civilian personnel stationed abroad declined 51 percent from 1972 to 1977, despite a troop strength reduction of only 22 percent and a higher paid volunteer army. As a result, these expenditures accounted for a smaller portion of total direct defense expenditures (chart 5). Personnel expenditures in foreign countries were curtailed, as purchasing power was eroded because of inflation and the depreciation of the U.S. dollar against a number of leading foreign currencies. The erosion of the purchasing power of the dollar had the opposite effect on the cost of support services for operation and maintenance of foreign bases, which increased despite reduced U.S. troop presence abroad. Payments for contractual services in 1977 were 21 percent higher than in 1972, and pay to foreign nationals rose 44 percent, even though the number of persons employed fell 31 percent (table 2). Outlays for petroleum products doubled from 1973 to 1974 following the OPEC oil embargo and sharp price increases, then dropped substantially due to a shift to domestic suppliers in order to minimize the armed forces' dependence on foreign suppliers, and a reduced need for petroleum following disengagement from Vietnam.

Western Europe

Direct defense expenditures in Western Europe increased from \$2.3 billion

in 1972 to \$3.1 billion in 1977, increasing from 48 percent of total military expenditures in 1972 to 53 percent in 1977 (table 3). The share attributable to Western Europe returned to the level that had existed before the U.S. involvement in Vietnam, as an increased commitment to NATO coincided with the withdrawal of U.S. troops from Southeast Asia, Korea, and Japan (chart 6).

Since 1972, about one-third of overseas expenditures were in Germany—more than in any other single country. Nearly half of U.S. troops overseas were stationed there, and Germany accounted for almost half of total payments for the hire of foreign nationals. In 1977, expenditures were \$1.9 billion, compared with \$1.4 billion in 1972. The cost of support services in Germany rose by \$0.6 billion from 1972 to 1977, a period in which the U.S. dollar depreciated 34 percent against the mark. Partly offsetting this rise, U.S. personnel stationed in Germany—in response to the reduced purchasing power of the U.S. dollar—switched \$0.2 billion of purchases from

contributing to the increase. Italy serves as the home port for a large portion of the U.S. Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean, and refueling is a major cost there.

In the United Kingdom, expenditures remained virtually stable at \$0.3 billion in 1972–76, and rose to \$0.4 billion in 1977. U.S. Marine Corps payments for over 100 Harrier aircraft, initiated in 1971, were completed in 1976. In 1977, the resulting drop in payments was more than offset by increased personnel expenditures, support costs, and petroleum purchases.

Southeast Asia

At the height of the Vietnam war in 1968, the United States stationed more than 1,000,000 troops overseas. As the U.S. military withdrew from Southeast Asia, the number of troops fell to 600,000 by the end of 1972 and has remained below 500,000 since then.

In 1977, expenditures in Southeast Asia were \$0.3 billion, down from \$0.8 billion in 1972; its share of total expenditures dropped to 5 percent from 16 percent. The major reductions occurred in Vietnam and other countries of Southeast Asia where expenditures had been made in support of the Vietnam war. Although U.S. combat forces left Vietnam by early 1973, outlays by U.S. and foreign contractors under



contract with the Department of Defense to provide support services to Vietnam did not end until the fall of Saigon in 1975.

Expenditures in Thailand virtually ended in 1976, as U.S. forces were reduced to token levels. In Taiwan, expenditures were reduced by one-third from 1972 to 1977, as troop strength dropped from 8,000 to 1,000. In the Philippines, both troop strength and local hire remained unchanged; expenditures rose 9 percent, reflecting higher prices and wages.

Korea

Expenditures in Korea were halved from a high of \$0.4 billion in 1969 to \$0.2 billion in 1974, as troop strength declined from 63,000 to 42,000. Although troop strength remained stable since 1974, increased costs raised expenditures by one-third.

Japan

In Japan, there was a 22-percent reduction in U.S. troops and a 50-percent reduction in the hire of Japanese nationals. The major factor was reduced

needs for outfitting and maintaining the U.S. Seventh Fleet after the Vietnam war. However, expenditures declined only slightly since 1972. The decline was limited by the 21-percent depreciation of the U.S. dollar against the yen and the nearly 12-percent average annual rise in Japanese prices.

Middle East

Expenditures in Middle East countries were \$0.9 billion in 1977, an increase of \$0.7 billion from 1972. Most of the increase occurred in the last 2 years and was related to construction contracts between the Governments of Saudi Arabia and the United States that specify that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will manage and supervise construction projects in Saudi Arabia. Payments abroad to U.S. and foreign contractors in connection with these projects rose from \$0.3 billion in 1976 to \$0.7 billion in 1977. (The receipts from these contracts are reported as transfers, and were discussed under U.S. Military Transfers.)

The other major development in the Middle East was the decline in petroleum purchases since 1974. The decline reflected the reduced need for fuel following disengagement from Vietnam and the switch by the Department of Defense to suppliers in other foreign countries and in the United States.

Outlook

From the inception of the FMS program until 1971, new orders were less than \$2.0 billion annually. In the last 4 years, however, new orders have ranged between \$8 billion and \$13 billion annually. For sophisticated military equipment and major construction programs, deliveries usually do not occur until several years after the orders are placed. As a result, although deliveries have increased significantly in recent years, new orders have exceeded them to such an extent that undelivered orders in the pipeline are approximately \$37 billion (chart 7). It is expected, therefore, that, on the basis of this backlog alone, deliveries in the next few years will equal or exceed the current level. In addition, it is likely that the level of new orders in 1978 will approximate that of recent years.

U.S. direct defense expenditures are likely to continue at or above their present level for the next few years. The costs associated with stationing U.S. troops abroad will increase further due to inflation, and substantial expenditures associated with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' reimbursable construction activity in Saudi Arabia will continue.

Technical Note

Transfers under U.S. military agency sales contracts consist primarily of deliveries of goods and services to foreign governments by U.S. military agencies under foreign military sales (FMS) contracts authorized by the Arms Ex-

port Control Act of 1976, and predecessor legislation. Only transfers resulting from agreements between the United States Government and a foreign government or international organization are included. Transfers under military grant programs and those resulting from direct agreements between a foreign government and a private U.S. contractor are included elsewhere in the U.S. international accounts.

Transfers under U.S. military agency sales contracts are goods transferred to, and services performed for, foreign governments for use in the United States or abroad, including transfers of goods from stocks at U.S. military installations abroad. Goods transferred to foreign governments are largely aircraft, naval vessels, vehicles, weapons, ammunition, missiles, and communications equipment, plus associated spare parts. Services provided to foreign governments are largely training, technical assistance, and logistical support. Transfers are reported at the time of delivery, not at the time contracts, orders, offers or any other types of agreement are negotiated.

In addition to FMS deliveries, transfers under U.S. military agency sales contracts also include small amounts of non-FMS deliveries resulting from U.S. military agency sales of surplus property to foreigners; sales of material and services to foreign countries or international organizations under logistical support programs; services provided by U.S. missions abroad that are financed by foreign governments under military assistance programs; and sales to foreigners of U.S. grant aid material declared excess by recipient countries and returned to the U.S. Government.


Direct defense expenditures are outlays for goods and services purchased abroad by the Department of Defense and by the U.S. Coast Guard. They consist of personal expenditures abroad by U.S. military and civilian personnel

employed by the military agencies; outlays by the Department of Defense for foreign goods, including those purchased abroad for resale to U.S. personnel in overseas post exchanges and commissaries; payments for hire of foreign personnel; overseas expenditures by U.S. and foreign contractors employed by the Department of Defense for the construction, operation, and maintenance of U.S. overseas military installations, and construction projects managed abroad by the Department of Defense; and U.S. payments to the commonly funded NATO infrastructure program. Excluded are foreign products imported into the United States by U.S. firms in fulfillment of defense contracts; these imports are included in merchandise trade.

Estimates of military transactions covered in this article are based on data supplied by operating agencies.

Federal Personal Income Taxes: Liabilities and Payments

PERSONAL income taxes are the largest single source of Federal revenue. Changes in these taxes, through their effect on consumer behavior, play a key role in the implementation of fiscal policy. The national income and product accounts (NIPA's) record personal taxes on a payment basis, but it has been argued that a liability basis is more appropriate for analyzing the impact of fiscal policy. This article presents a series on quarterly Federal personal income tax liabilities for 1949–76 (table 1). It describes the methodologies underlying the payment and liability series and compares the behavior of the two series since 1949. It also reports on a test designed to determine which of the two series is a better predictor of consumption.

Methodology: payment series

Most wage earners make Federal income tax payments through employer withholdings. These payments, along with Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) payments, are deducted from wages and salaries by employers, and sent to the Treasury. The timelag between payments and collections by the Treasury varies from 3 days for large employers to about 1 month for small ones. The self-employed and other individuals, including wage earners, with income not subject to withholding make tax payments quarterly. Tax-

payers determine the difference between payments and liabilities when they file tax returns, which is normally in the months immediately following the liability year. If liabilities exceed payments, a final settlement equal to the balance due should accompany the tax return. If payments exceed liabilities, a refund is due and is usually paid to the taxpayer within several months.

In the methodology underlying the NIPA's, withheld tax payments are derived from collections data. Quarterly estimates of the combined total of withheld income taxes and FICA payments are derived by adjusting monthly collections for the timelag between payments and collections. Next, the FICA component is estimated using data on taxable wages supplied by the Social Security Administration. The combined total less the FICA component is the quarterly NIPA series of withheld income taxes before seasonal adjustment. The seasonally adjusted series is derived by summing the quarterly unadjusted series to annual totals, and allocating these totals to quarters largely by the movement of seasonally adjusted wages and salaries. Pending the availability of the annual withheld income taxes, the quarterly series is derived by multiplying wages and salaries by an estimated effective tax rate derived from Treasury estimates prepared for the annual Federal budget.

Treasury data on nonwithheld income tax collections—quarterly payments and final settlements—are an approximation of payments by individuals. Similarly, Treasury data on tax refunds are a close approximation of actual receipts by individuals. The

seasonally adjusted series are derived by allocating annual totals to quarters with allowance for legislative tax changes. Legislative tax changes are identified as permanent or temporary. In the case of a permanent change, the series moves to a new level in the first quarter of the calendar year, and continues with a smooth pattern. For example, a permanent change in the capital gains tax would be allocated to each of the quarters of the first year in which the change occurs. In the case of a temporary change, the series reflects the underlying unadjusted data. For example, a one-time tax rebate is not allocated to each of the quarters, but is recorded in the quarter when paid.

The Federal income tax series is the sum of withheld and nonwithheld payments, less refunds. It is the major component of the personal tax and nontax series in the NIPA's.¹ Personal income less personal tax and nontax receipts equals disposable personal income.

Methodology: liability series

The personal income tax liability series is based on annual taxable income and tax liabilities published by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) in *Statistics of Income, Individual Income Tax Returns* (Individual SOI). The SOI data are derived from a sample of individual income tax returns.

Quarterly estimates of taxable income are derived by adjusting quarterly

personal income. The method of adjustment is an extension of that used in making annual reconciliations of personal income and taxable income. The latter involves: (1) identifying and measuring the types of income, such as transfer payments and capital gains, needed to reconcile personal income with adjusted gross income (AGI), and (2) identifying and measuring the deductions and exemptions needed to reconcile AGI with taxable income.² Legislative changes enacted during a year that affect final taxable income are recorded beginning in the first quarter of the year.

An initial estimate of quarterly tax liabilities is derived by multiplying quarterly taxable income by an effective tax rate (ETR). The ETR is calculated by dividing annual income tax liabilities before credits by annual taxable income (both from SOI). Table 2 shows the annual ETR's for 1949-76. Prior to 1964, the ETR changes little from year to year, except when tax rates change, and the ETR for the year is used for each quarter of the year. For 1964-76, the ETR tends to rise with income. The uptrend probably reflects changes introduced by the Tax Reduction Act of 1964, which split the \$2,000 bottom brackets into four \$500 brackets subject to progressively increasing tax rates. Under the new rate structure, general increases in income levels apparently began to produce increases in the ETR. Accordingly, quarterly estimates of liabilities for this period were derived by smoothing the annual estimates.

The final liability series is derived by adjusting the initial series to take account of tax credits, fiduciary income tax, audit assessments, and under-coverage of the SOI data.

A more detailed explanation of the derivation of the liability series is provided in the technical notes.

Pattern of payments and liabilities

Chart 8 shows Federal personal income tax liabilities and payments for 1949-76 and the excess of liabilities

over payments. In general, the liability series is more responsive to changes in income than the payment series, because the nonwithheld and refunds components of the payment series can assume patterns unrelated to the growth of income. As a result, when income growth is steady or accelerating, liabilities tend to exceed payments; when income growth is decelerating or when income is declining, payments tend to exceed liabilities.

In 1950, a large excess of liabilities over payments is caused partly by rapidly growing income, and partly by differences in the way the two series reflect an increase in statutory rates enacted late in the year, but retroactive to January 1: Liabilities reflect the increase in rates in the first quarter; payments do not increase until the fourth quarter when higher withholding rates are effective. In 1951, the pattern is repeated. Another statutory rate increase is effective January 1, but withholding rates do not increase until the fourth quarter. In the first quarter of 1954, liabilities and payments decline; a new withholding schedule reflecting a tax cut is effective at the beginning of the year.

For 1955-63, statutory tax rates are constant, and liabilities and payments both grow slowly. The excess of liabilities over payments is closely related to the cyclical rate of growth of income. For example, during the recovery from the 1957-58 recession, liabilities exceed payments for six quarters. As the economy moves into recession in 1960, payments exceed liabilities for five quarters.

During the next five quarters of recovery, liabilities again exceed payments.

The 1955-63 pattern is broken by the 1964 tax cut. Liabilities decline in the first quarter, because of a reduction in statutory tax rates. Payments decline sharply in the second quarter, because of a reduction in withholding rates. The reduction in withholding rates was designed to cut payments more than liabilities, in order to provide immediate stimulus to the economy. As a result, there is a large excess of liabilities over payments in the last three quarters of 1964. In the first half of 1965, the opposite holds because net payments are boosted by high final settlements and low refunds, while liabilities are reduced by another drop in statutory tax rates.


For 1965-69, tax liabilities increase rapidly, largely due to uninterrupted economic growth and accelerating inflation. Payments also increase, and are stepped up in 1966 when graduated withholding rates replace a single withholding rate. Enactment in mid-1968 of the income tax surcharge further increases liabilities and payments, but not in the same pattern (table 3). The surcharge increases liabilities in 1968 by 7.5 percent, in 1969 by 10 percent, and in 1970 by 2.5 percent. Within each year, it is distributed in proportion to taxable income. On a payment basis, the surcharge begins in the third quarter of 1968 and ends in the second quarter of 1970. The withholding surcharge is 10 percent beginning in July 1968, is reduced to 5 percent in January 1970, and ends in June 1970.

In the first half of 1968, when liabilities include the surcharge but payments do not, liabilities exceed payments. In the last half, when withholding rates increase, reflecting the surcharge, payments exceed liabilities. As can be seen from the chart, this shift is about \$7 billion (annual rate). In the first half of 1969, payments substantially exceed liabilities, as the surcharge on a payment basis reaches its highest level because of large final net settlements.

In the first quarter of 1970, liabilities fall sharply, partly because of the reduction in the surcharge, and partly because of increases in the standard deduction and the personal exemption. Payments fall sharply in the third quarter, reflecting the end of withholdings for the surcharge. Both liabilities and payments decline in the first quarter of 1971. The decline in liabilities reflects the end of the surcharge and further increases in deductions and exemptions; the decline in payments reflects a lower withholding schedule.

In 1972, payments exceed liabilities by large amounts in all quarters. Overwithholding results from increases in withholding rates designed to eliminate widespread underwithholding. The increase in withholding rates was accompanied by an increase in the number of withholding exemptions available to taxpayers, so that taxpayers not previously underwithheld could offset the higher rates. However, many taxpayers in this group did not claim the additional exemptions, and their failure to do so results in a large excess of payments over liabilities. In 1973, payments and liabilities do not differ much, because continued overwithholding offsets high refunds

stemming from 1972 overwithholding. Because of the high refunds, payments, decline in the first quarter of 1973, and then continue to increase rapidly through 1974, along with liabilities. Liabilities increase despite the onset of recession in 1974, because rapid inflation increases income.

In the first quarter of 1975, liabilities fall \$10 billion (annual rate), as a result of several factors. First, the standard deduction is increased in 1975, reducing taxable income beginning in the first quarter. Second, normal growth of the tax base does not occur due to the recession. Income increases very little. The sharp contraction in real economic activity is about offset by continuing high inflation. Third, much of the increase in income is in farm proprietors' income, and reflects an increase in the rate of farm inventory accumulation. The inventory change component of farm income is largely untaxed under the individual income tax.

In the second quarter of 1975, liabilities fall almost \$30 billion (annual rate) and payments fall almost \$40 billion. Both series reflect the payment in this quarter of an \$8 billion rebate on 1974 tax liabilities—over \$30 billion at an annual rate. The payment series also reflects a reduction in withholding rates associated with an increase in the standard deduction. The rebate is treated identically in the liability and payment series. A strict liability treatment would require a reduction of 1974 liabilities. However, because the rebate was not conceived until well after the end of 1974, it is shown as reducing tax liabilities at the time of payment, mostly in the second quarter of 1975.

In the first half of 1976, tax liabilities exceed tax payments by about \$5 billion (annual rate). The excess is largely due

to lower net final payments resulting from certain provisions of the Tax Reduction Act of 1975—such as tax credits for purchases of new homes—that reduce liabilities in 1975 and payments in the first half of 1976.

Personal taxes and consumer behavior

The NIPA's record personal taxes on a payment basis. Given the data sources, more reliable current estimates of tax payments than of tax liabilities can be prepared. Choice of the payment series also has been justified on the ground that consumer spending behavior is affected more by tax payments than by tax liabilities. However, it often has been argued that consumers have a longer planning horizon than is implied by the choice of the payment series and has been proposed that personal taxes be recorded on a liability basis.

An econometric test was conducted to find out which of the two series is the better predictor of personal consumption expenditures (PCE). The test suggests that in two of three periods when there were substantial differences between tax liabilities and tax payments, disposable personal income derived using liabilities (DPIL) predicted PCE somewhat more accurately than did disposable personal income derived using payments (DPI).

The test utilized the consumption sector of the BEA short-term econometric model as it existed in 1977. This sector consisted of 13 equations for the various PCE components, 11 of which depend directly or indirectly on disposable income. For the test, the equations that are estimated with DPI for the regular use of the model were reestimated using DPIL. Errors in the prediction of PCE using DPI and DPIL were then compared.

Comparisons were made for 1964-66, the period following the 1964 tax cut; 1968-71, the period of the surcharge; and 1972-73, a period of substantial overwithholding. Each set of error calculations was carried out in two ways: by "single period" solution and by "dynamic solution" within sub-periods. In the single period tests, actual values were used for all explanatory variables, including lagged PCE. In the dynamic tests, computed values for PCE were obtained using predicted rather than actual values for lagged PCE. Both sets of tests were used because the choice depends on the precise theoretical interpretation—about which there is no agreement—given to a consumption function that includes consumption as a lagged dependent variable.

For 1968-71 and 1972-73, DPIL predicts total PCE more accurately than DPI for both sets of test. The superiority of DPIL is more significant in the dynamic tests. For 1964-66, DPI is superior to DPIL; again the dynamic results are more significant. Analysis of the major consumption components indicates that DPI and DPIL tend to differ most in predicting consumption of nondurables.

Although these results slightly favor DPIL, no clear conclusions can be drawn. The lack of consistency in the results is not surprising. Grounds exist for doubting both DPI and DPIL as ideal income variables for predicting consumption. DPIL is commonly criticized on the grounds that consumers are no aware of their liabilities. For example, taxpayers cannot anticipate perfectly in the first quarter of a liability year all possible legislation that may affect liabilities. DPI has been similarly criticized because some feel there is no adequate way to seasonally adjust tax payments.³

Ando argues that the seasonal adjustment is inadequate because the pattern of seasonal variation of payments depends on the level of income of the preceding year, on the rate of change of income from 2 years earlier, and on changes in tax laws in 2 previous years as well as the current year.

Technical Notes: Derivation of the Liability Series

The product of quarterly taxable income and the quarterly effective tax rate yields quarterly income tax before credits; annual controls are from SOI. The final liability series is derived after several adjustments, which are described below.

Quarterly taxable income

IRS data on taxable income are available only on an annual basis.⁴ BEA has published reconciliations between annual personal income and taxable income. (See the December 1976 SURVEY OF CURRENT BUSINESS.) For the calculation of quarterly taxable income, this reconciliation is estimated on a quarterly basis.

Most of the large reconciliation items—transfer payments, other labor income, personal contributions for social insurance, and the capital consumption adjustment—are available quarterly. For items not available quarterly, indicator series are used whenever possible to interpolate and extrapolate annual totals, and legislative changes are taken into account. For example, a Securities and Exchange Commission series on the market value of stock sold on registered exchanges is used, after seasonal adjustment, as a quarterly indicator of capital gains. Items for which neither quarterly data nor indicators are available are smoothed. In most cases, the magnitudes involved are small, and annual totals show steady increases.

Quarterly effective tax rate and adjustments

The effective tax rate shown in table 2 is income tax before credits divided by taxable income, both from SOI. Income tax before credits excludes certain adjustments to the initial estimates of quarterly income tax liabilities; these adjustments are described below.

Tax credits.—Liabilities are reduced by statutory tax credits such as the retirement income credit, foreign tax credit, earned income credit.

Surcharge and rebate.—The surcharge as shown in table 3 is added to liabilities for 1968-70. The rebate is subtracted in 1975, mostly in the second quarter.

Fiduciary income tax.—The fiduciary income tax is levied upon trusts established by individuals, and is tabulated separately from individual income taxes in SOI. Fiduciary income taxes are included in the payments added to the liability series to make it comparable.

Audit assessment.—SOI measures tax liabilities as reported on returns. Audits increase liabilities, and estimates of audit assessments are added to liabilities as reported in SOI.

Level adjustment.—To test the coverage of the SOI-based liability series, collections data were used to derive an independent estimate of annual liabilities. Specifically, nonwithheld taxes and refund payments were lagged to the liability year. The method is not precise for single years, but provides a good estimate of liabilities over an extended period. The sum of collections-based liabilities for 1949-76 exceeds the sum of SOI-based liabilities by about 1 percent.⁵ Therefore, the SOI-based series was increased 1 percent.

5. Collections-based liabilities in 1973 exceed SOI-based liabilities by 2.5 percent; in no other year does the difference exceed 1.9 percent. Other evidence suggests that 1973 SOI liabilities are understated. First, BEA's measure of adjusted gross income increases much more in 1973 than the IRS measure. Second, the IRS acknowledges that processing problems were encountered in 1973, and that their own data indicate a possible understatement of total adjusted gross income. Therefore, the 1973 IRS value for adjusted gross income (and thus taxable income and tax liabilities) was increased to a level consistent with BEA's estimate of adjusted gross income. The overall one-percent adjustment was calculated after the 1973 adjustment.

Revised Manufacturing and Trade Inventories and Sales, 1967-77

Manufacturing and trade inventories (at book value), sales, and inventory-sales ratios, which are regularly shown on pages S-5 and S-12 of the SURVEY of CURRENT BUSINESS, have been revised back to January 1967. Tables

1-5 incorporate the revisions, which affected manufacturing inventories and sales and retail inventories. These tables also incorporate the revised retail sales and merchant wholesale inventories and sales published by the

Bureau of the Census in November 1977.

Manufacturing inventories and sales have been adjusted by the Census Bureau to the levels of the 1974, 1975, and 1976 *Annual Survey of Manufactures*. Detailed estimates and additional information about the adjustment methods are published in *Current Industrial Reports*, Series M3-1.7 "Manu-

facturers' Shipments, Inventories, and Orders: 1958-1977." The revised retail sales and merchant wholesale inventories and sales are published in "Monthly Retail Sales: January 1967-August 1977 (Revised)" *Current Business Reports* (BR-13-77S) and "Monthly Wholesale Trade Sales and Inventories: January 1967-August 1977 (Revised)" *Current Business Reports* (BW-13-77S).

Retail inventories have been adjusted by the Bureau of Economic Analysis to the levels of the Census Bureau's *Annual Retail Trade Survey* for 1976, which includes revised figures for 1975. Retail inventories for earlier years have been adjusted to make them comparable with the revised retail sales and to reflect the 1972 Standard Industrial Classification.

In addition to the revisions described above, the manufacturing, retail trade, and merchant wholesale inventories and sales incorporate new seasonal adjustment factors.

Manufacturing inventories and sales comparable with those for 1967-77 are published in *Current Industrial Reports*, Series M3-1.7 "Manufacturers' Ship-
