Better reconciliation of the U.S. economic accounts

Economic measures are produced with varying frequencies—monthly, quarterly, or annual, for example—and with different objectives. Monthly or quarterly statistics aim to provide a timely picture of short-term activity, for example, while annual data often provide a more accurate picture of medium- and long-term trends. The most comprehensive data are collected by the Census Bureau's economic census, which publishes data every 5 years.

Theoretically, higher frequency measurements should be consistent with lower frequency benchmarks. In practice, however, this is rarely the case. In a statistical system that uses lowand high-frequency data, such as the U.S. national economic accounting system, observed data need to be adjusted for consistency, satisfying both temporal and contemporaneous constraints.

A strong reconciliation process would also aim to preserve as much of the substance of the preliminary information as possible.

In a recent Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) working paper, Baoline Chen and Thomas Howells, economists at BEA; Tommaso Di Fonzo of the University of Padova, Italy; and Marco Marini of the International Monetary Fund reconciled the 2003–2007 U.S. annual input-output (I-O)

accounts, the gross domestic product (GDP)-by-industry accounts, and expenditure-based GDP accounts with the 2002 and 2007 quinquennial I-O benchmark accounts.

The U.S. national accounts system takes three approaches to measuring GDP: production, expenditures, and incomes.

For the entire system to be internally consistent, production-based GDP (measured as total output less total inputs from the I-O accounts), expenditure-based GDP (measured as total final expenditures from the national income and product accounts (NIPAs)), and gross domestic income (GDI) (as measured in the NIPAs) must all be reconciled.

Accordingly, the objective of the authors was to adjust the preliminary series such that they (1) are consistent with the quinquennial benchmarks available, (2) fulfill all the accounting relationships for any given year, and (3) show movements that are as close as possible to the preliminary information.

The working paper showed that reconciling annual preliminary series of national accounts with the I-O benchmarks was best achieved through a constrained optimization procedure based on a movement preservation principle—specifically a least squares procedure based on the proportional first difference (PFD) method pioneered by Frank Denton in 1971 and modified by P.A. Cholette in

1984.

This procedure was compared with a pure proportional (PROP) adjustment procedure.

The results showed that the authors' objectives were best achieved through the procedure based on the PFD criterion; this procedure was able to smooth the differences observed between the preliminary and the benchmark data, reducing the impact of the correction by distributing it over all the years.

However, the authors also noted that the PFD-based adjustment didn't work as well for a small subset of series that included breaks in time and changes from positive to negative values. Because these movements are difficult to preserve, they were adjusted according to the PROP criterion.

In general, the authors showed that a constrained optimization procedure, one that minimizes a combined PFD-PROP objective function, improves the overall adjustment of the system, minimizing the impact on the year-to-year changes of the preliminary series.

The paper relied on a study by Chen and others in 2013 that sought to fulfill similar objectives using older data. The release of the 2007 benchmark input-output tables by BEA in January 2014 made it possible for the authors to extend the analysis.

GDP and the Economy

Advance Estimates for the Fourth Quarter of 2014


EAL GROSS domestic product (GDP) increased 2.6 percent at an annual rate in the fourth quarter of 2014 after increasing 5.0 percent in the third quarter, according to the advance estimates of the national income and product accounts (NIPAs) (chart 1 and table 1).1 For the year 2014, real GDP increased 2.4 percent after increasing 2.2 percent in 2013 (see page 6).

The slowdown in real GDP growth in the fourth quarter primarily reflected an upturn in imports, a downturn in federal government spending, and slowdowns in nonresidential fixed investment and in exports that were partly offset by an upturn in inventory investment and a pickup in consumer spending.2

- Prices of goods and services purchased by U.S. residents decreased 0.3 percent in the fourth quarter after increasing 1.4 percent in the third quarter. Food prices slowed in the fourth quarter, and energy prices decreased much more in the fourth quarter than in the third quarter. Excluding food and energy, gross domestic purchases prices increased 0.7 percent after increasing 1.6 percent (see table 2).
- Real disposable personal income (DPI) increased 3.8 percent in the fourth quarter after increasing 2.0 percent in the third quarter. Current-dollar DPI increased 3.3 percent in the fourth quarter, the same increase as in the third quarter (see table 3). The acceleration in real DPI reflected a downturn in the implicit price deflator for consumer spending, which is used to deflate DPI.
- The personal saving rate, personal saving as a percentage of current-dollar DPI, was 4.6 percent in the fourth quarter; in the third quarter, the rate was 4.7 percent.

Consumer spending picked up in the fourth quarter, reflecting pickups in both services (mainly household utilities) and goods (primarily clothing and footwear and gasoline and other energy goods).

Nonresidential fixed investment slowed, primarily reflecting a downturn in equipment (primarily in transportation and industrial equipment).

Inventory investment turned up, primarily reflecting an upturn in nonfarm inventory investment, specifically an upturn in manufacturing and a pickup in wholesale trade that were partly offset by a larger decrease in retail trade.

Exports of goods and services slowed, reflecting a slowdown in goods exports that was partly offset by an upturn in services exports.

Imports of goods and services turned up in the fourth quarter, reflecting an upturn in goods imports and a pickup in services imports.

The upturn in goods imports primarily reflected upturns in consumer goods except food and automotive and in petroleum and products.

Federal government spending turned down; the downturn was more than accounted for by a downturn in national defense spending that primarily reflected a large downturn in intermediate services purchased (specifically personnel support services).

Real final sales of domestic product, real GDP less inventory investment, increased 1.8 percent in the fourth quarter after increasing 5.0 percent in the third quarter.

Prices paid by U.S. residents, as measured by the gross domestic purchases price index, turned down, decreasing 0.3 percent in the fourth quarter after increasing 1.4 percent in the third quarter. The downturn primarily reflected downturns in consumer spending prices and in prices paid by state and local governments.

The downturn in consumer spending prices primarily reflected a downturn in the prices paid for goods (mainly a larger decrease in the prices paid for gasoline and other energy goods).

Prices paid by state and local governments turned down, decreasing 0.8 percent after increasing 2.1 percent. The downturn primarily reflected a downturn in the prices paid for consumption expenditures, mainly intermediate goods (specifically petroleum products).

Consumer prices excluding food and energy, a measure of the "core" rate of inflation, slowed, increasing 1.1 percent after increasing 1.4 percent.

Note on Prices

BEA's gross domestic purchases price index is the most comprehensive index of prices paid by U.S. residents for all goods and services. It is derived from the prices of personal consumption expenditures (PCE), private investment, and government consumption expenditures and gross investment

BEA also produces price indexes for all the components of GDP. The PCE price index is a measure of the total cost of consumer goods and services, including durable goods, nondurable goods, and services. PCE prices for food, for energy goods and services, and for all items except food and energy are also estimated and reported.

Because prices for food and for energy can be volatile, the

price measure that excludes food and energy is often used as a measure of underlying, or "core," inflation. The core PCE price index includes purchased meals and beverages, such as restaurant meals and pet food. (See the FAQ "What is the core PCE price index?" on BEA's Web site.)

BEA also prepares a supplemental PCE price index, the "market-based" PCE price index, that is based on market transactions for which there are corresponding price measures. This index excludes many imputed expenditures, such as financial services furnished without payment, that are included in PCE and in the PCE price index. BEA also prepares a market-based measure that excludes food and energy.

Personal income, which is measured in current dollars, accelerated in the fourth quarter, increasing \$136.8 billion after increasing \$131.6 billion in the third quarter. The acceleration primarily reflected accelerations in wages and salaries and in proprietors' income that were partly offset by a deceleration in government social benefits to persons and a larger decrease in personal interest income.

The pickup in wages and salaries reflected an acceleration in services-producing industries and a smaller acceleration in goods-producing industries.

The pickup in proprietors' income reflected a smaller decrease in farm proprietors' income and a pickup in nonfarm proprietors' income.


Personal interest income decreased \$9.5 billion after decreasing \$3.5 billion.

The deceleration in government social benefits to persons primarily reflected a slowdown in Medicaid benefits.

Personal saving—disposable personal income less personal outlays-was \$601.7 billion in the fourth quarter, decreasing \$15.5 billion after decreasing \$38.4 billion.

The personal saving rate was 4.6 percent in the fourth quarter; in the third quarter, the rate was 4.7 percent.

Source Data and Key Assumptions for the Advance Estimates of GDP

The advance estimates of many components of GDP are based on 3 months of source data, but the estimates of some components are based on only 2 months of data. For the following items, the number of months for which data are available is shown in parentheses.

Consumer spending: sales of retail stores (3), unit auto and truck sales (3), consumers' shares of auto and truck sales (2), motor vehicle fuels data (1), and electricity and gas usage and unit-value data (1);

Nonresidential fixed investment: unit auto and truck sales (3), construction spending (value put in place) (2), manufacturers' shipments of machinery and equipment (3), and exports and imports of machinery and equipment (2);

Residential fixed investment: construction spending (value put in place) (2), single-family housing starts (3), sales of new homes (3), and sales of existing houses (3);

Inventory investment: trade and nondurable-goods manufacturing inventories (2), durable-goods manufacturing inventories (3), and unit auto and truck inventories (3);

Net exports of goods and services: exports and imports of goods and services (2) and values and quantities of petroleum imports (2);

Government spending: federal government outlays (3),

state and local government construction spending (value put in place) (2), and federal and state and local government employment (3);

Compensation: private employment, average hourly earnings, and average weekly hours (3); and

Prices: consumer price indexes (3), producer price indexes (3), and export and import price indexes (3).

Key assumptions

When source data were unavailable, BEA made various assumptions for December, including the following (table 4):

- An increase in nonresidential structures,
- An increase in single-family structures,
- An increase in multifamily structures,
- A decrease in nondurable-goods manufacturing inventories,
- An increase in nonmotor vehicle merchant wholesale and retail inventories,
- A decrease in exports of goods excluding gold and an increase in imports of goods excluding gold, and
- An increase in state and local government construction spending.

A more comprehensive list is available on BEA's Web site.

Nonmonetary gold is included in balance-of-payments exports and imports, but it is not used directly in estimating exports and imports in the national income and product accounts.

Real GDP accelerated in 2014, primarily reflecting an acceleration in nonresidential fixed investment, a smaller decrease in federal government spending, and accelerations in inventory investment, in consumer spending, and in state and local government spending that were partly offset by an acceleration in imports and a deceleration in residential fixed investment.

Consumer spending added 1.72 percentage points to the change in real GDP in 2014 after adding 1.64 percentage points in 2013. The main contributor was a slight pickup in spending on services.

The acceleration in nonresidential fixed investment primarily reflected an upturn in structures, mainly power and communication structures.

Residential fixed investment added 0.05 percentage point to the change in real GDP in 2014 after adding 0.33 percentage point in 2013.

Inventory investment added 0.15 percentage point to the change in real GDP after adding 0.06 percentage point.

Imports subtracted 0.64 percentage point from the change in real GDP after subtracting 0.19 percentage point. The pickup in imports primarily reflected a pickup in imports of goods.

Federal government spending subtracted 0.14 percentage point from the change in real GDP in 2014 after subtracting 0.45 percentage point in 2013.

State and local government spending added 0.11 percentage point to the change in real GDP after adding 0.06 percentage point.

Chart 3. Contributions to the Change in Real GDP in 2014





Chart 4. Change in Selected Components of Real GDP

Q&A With BEA Director Brian C. Moyer

Brian C. Moyer became the director of the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) in September 2014. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees in economics from the University of Maryland and a Ph.D. in economics from American University.

Following is a January interview with Mr. Moyer, originally published in Amstat News, the membership magazine of the American Statistical Association.

What about this position appealed to you?

I'm thrilled to serve as the head of a federal agency whose work is an important factor in the decision making of millions of Americans, business people, researchers, and policymakers both in the United States and abroad. One of the most exciting and appealing aspects of this job is the opportunity to interact with BEA's customers, to hear firsthand how our data impact people's lives and to learn how we can refine and expand the data we provide to make it even more relevant and useful.

I actually joined BEA in 1993 and served as deputy director before I was named director in September 2014. So I come to my current post with a deep appreciation for BEA's mission and its innovative spirit. We not only measure the \$17 trillion U.S. economy via our signature Gross Domestic Product statistics, but we also produce statistics on how consumers and industries are faring, how regional economies are performing, and how the United States is doing in the global economy.

Describe the top 2–3 priorities you have for BEA.

My top priority is making sure that BEA remains innovative so we can continue to deliver economic statistics that accurately measure an ever-changing economy in a cost-effective manner. Another priority is to create new measures that are relevant to businesses, policymakers, and the public. We also must continue to improve on disseminating our data and making sure it is accessible to sophisticated and casual data hounds alike.



What do you see as your biggest challenge(s) for the BEA?

Ensuring our economic measures keep pace with the effect of globalization, as well as an ever-changing U.S. economy, are certainly challenges. Figuring out ways to continue to leverage Big Data and to forge more integration across U.S. statistical agencies also are challenges. In addition, it's critical that we recruit and retain talented people. BEA's successful track record of producing timely, accurate, and relevant economic statistics in an objective and cost-effective manner hinges on the innovative work of its employees.

What kind of support from the statistical community do you look for?

Getting feedback from outside experts like economists, statisticians, and accountants, as well as from business people and the public, about our work and our ideas is important to us. We have a BEA advisory committee that meets twice a year, and we conduct conferences with data users to get their thoughts and share with them things we are doing or exploring. Collaborating with other statistical agencies on projects is not only an efficient use of resources, but it also offers a wonderful way to crosspollinate talent and ideas. Over the year, BEA has built even stronger collaborative relationships with the U.S. Census Bureau, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Treasury Department, and Federal Reserve, among others.

Prior to your tenure, what do you see as the biggest recent accomplishment of the agency?

BEA has been able to produce new, relevant economic products despite a resource-constrained environment. We created a way to adjust people's incomes across states and metro areas so they can be compared across regions and through time. We created the first set of statistics measuring how much consumers spend in each state. We produced statistics that, for the first time, tell us the economic effect of industries each quarter and the economic performance of states each quarter. We are working on a more accurate measure of health care spending on a disease-by-disease basis. We also are working on income measures that will give us more insights into how different households are faring.

The Effects of Corporate Inversions on the International and National Economic Accounts

RECENTLY, a growing number of articles in the media have noted U.S. corporations announcing that they intend to move their headquarters overseas. This practice is known as a corporate inversion, which occurs when a U.S. corporation that is currently the ultimate owner of its worldwide operations takes steps to become a wholly owned subsidiary of a foreign corporation. A U.S. corporation can initiate an inversion either by creating a foreign corporation to be its new parent or by merging with an existing foreign corporation and ceding control.

It is often reported in the media that U.S. corporations invert in order to reduce their global corporate tax obligation and to access more of their overseas profits. The U.S. Internal Revenue Service employs a worldwide tax system, in which it seeks to tax all income, domestic or foreign, from U.S.-based corporations at the same rate. In contrast, the tax authorities of some other countries, such as Luxembourg, employ territorial tax systems that tax only income that was generated in the taxing country. These tax systems allow resident multinational corporations to reduce their global tax obligation by realizing income in foreign countries with favorable corporate tax rates where the income is beyond the reach of the home country tax authority. Many U.S. corporations retain a sizable portion of the profits earned by their foreign subsidiaries overseas, partly because foreign corporate income tax rates in some countries are lower than those in the United States and because U.S. taxes on overseas earnings are due when the earnings are repatriated. By moving their global headquarters from the United States to foreign countries with different tax systems, U.S. corporations that invert may reduce their global tax obligation.

This BEA Briefing takes a quick look at how corporate inversions affect the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA)'s international and national economic accounts.

Inversions and BEA's international statistics

When a U.S. corporation inverts, it becomes foreign owned and is then included in the statistics on foreign

direct investment in the United States, or inward direct investment, produced by BEA. To compile these statistics, BEA collects data on all U.S. companies in which a foreign investor has at least 10 percent voting ownership through mandatory quarterly, annual, and benchmark surveys of foreign direct investment in the United States. The foreign direct investment position in the United States—which comprises the direct investors' equity in, and net outstanding loans to, their U.S. affiliates—generally increases after an inversion because the inverting U.S. corporation becomes an asset of a foreign investor. Cross-border equity and debt flows into the United States will generally also occur as a result of the newly created equity and debt positions of the foreign owner in its U.S. affiliate. The activities of multinational enterprises (AMNE) statistics—which provide data on the overall operations of U.S. affiliates of foreign multinational enterprises (MNEs) and include data items such as employment, capital expenditures, value added, and research and development (R&D) expenditures—generally also increases as a result of inversions.

BEA's direct investment surveys do not collect information on whether a U.S. corporation became foreign owned as a result of a corporate inversion, but BEA used publicly available sources of information on corporate inversions to estimate the share of the AMNE statistics accounted for by inverted corporations for 2012, the most recent year for which data are available. According to these estimates, the shares ranged from 6.3 percent of R&D expenditures to 1.2 percent of net income (table 1). The significance of inversions in

BEA's direct investment statistics may have grown appreciably since 2012, as some sources in the media indicate that the number of new U.S. corporate inversions has accelerated recently.¹

Corporate inversions may also affect BEA's U.S. direct investment abroad, or outward direct investment, statistics. If a U.S. multinational enterprise transfers the ownership of some or all of its foreign affiliates to its new foreign owner, both the outward position and the outward AMNE statistics will generally be affected. The outward position will generally decrease, and associated equity and debt inflows will result from the removal of the equity and debt positions of the U.S. parent in its foreign affiliates when they are transferred to the new foreign owner. The outward AMNE statistics will also generally decrease when the activities of the transferred foreign affiliates are removed. At this time, the effect of inversions on the outward AMNE statistics cannot be quantified. Additionally, if the inversion does not result in a change in the ownership of the foreign affiliates, that is, if the U.S. corporation that is now a U.S. affiliate of a foreign MNE continues to own overseas affiliates, the inversion would probably not affect the statistics.

Inversions and BEA's national statistics

The effect of inversions on outward and inward direct investment statistics are reflected in select aggregates of the national income and product accounts (NIPAs), most notably, the income receipts from, and payments to, the rest of the world and the NIPA aggregates that include these data in their derivation—corporate profits and gross national income.

While BEA is not currently able to estimate the effects of corporate inversions on the NIPAs, the shaded aggregates in table 2 are those that would be affected by corporate inversions. Generally inversions would reduce gross national income, that is, income resulting from the current production of goods and services by U.S.-owned labor and capital. Corporate profits, the portion of the total gross national income earned from current production that is accounted for by U.S. corporations, would also be reduced by a decrease in net profit receipts from the rest of the world (profit receipts from the rest of the world less profit payments to the rest of the world). The introduction of a new foreign owner generates a payment to the rest of the

world in the form of direct investment income on equity that includes the worldwide profits of the inverting corporation. However, this payment may be offset to some extent by a receipt from the rest of the world in the form of dividends that are paid by the new foreign corporation to its U.S. shareholders, some of whom may be former shareholders in the U.S. corporation that inverted. Given that corporations rarely pay dividends equal to, or more than, their total current earnings, the inversion's effect on profit payments to the rest of the world would typically be greater than its effect on profit receipts from the rest of the world, and therefore the effect on net profit receipts from rest of the world would be negative. This negative impact also affects the higher level aggregates that include net profit receipts from the rest of the world in their derivation—corporate profits and total gross national in-

Gross domestic income, which is income resulting from the current production of goods and services in the domestic economy, would not be affected by inversions because it excludes net profit receipts from the rest of the world.
