1938 Supplement to the Survey of
Current Business**

The table of monthly business statistics presented on page 19 et seq. has been changed in this issue to conform to the set-up of the 1938 Supplement to the Survey of Current Business, which is ready for distribution. The notes previously carried on this table have been eliminated, since the descriptive notes in the Supplement provide more adequate data concerning each item.

A few series have been added in this number which did not appear in the 1938 Supplement; these are indicated by an asterisk (*) and a brief footnote is carried where such is necessary. Some series for which current data are not available have been dropped.

It is urged that everyone using the SURVEY obtain and preserve a copy of the 1938 Supplement. This is essential, not only to obtain the qualifying data, but to secure, in convenient form, figures for earlier periods than shown in the table in the monthly issues. Another supplement will not be issued until 1940. The 1936 Supplement, in which monthly data for the years 1932 and 1933 are shown, is still on sale at the Government Printing Office. The price is 35 cents.

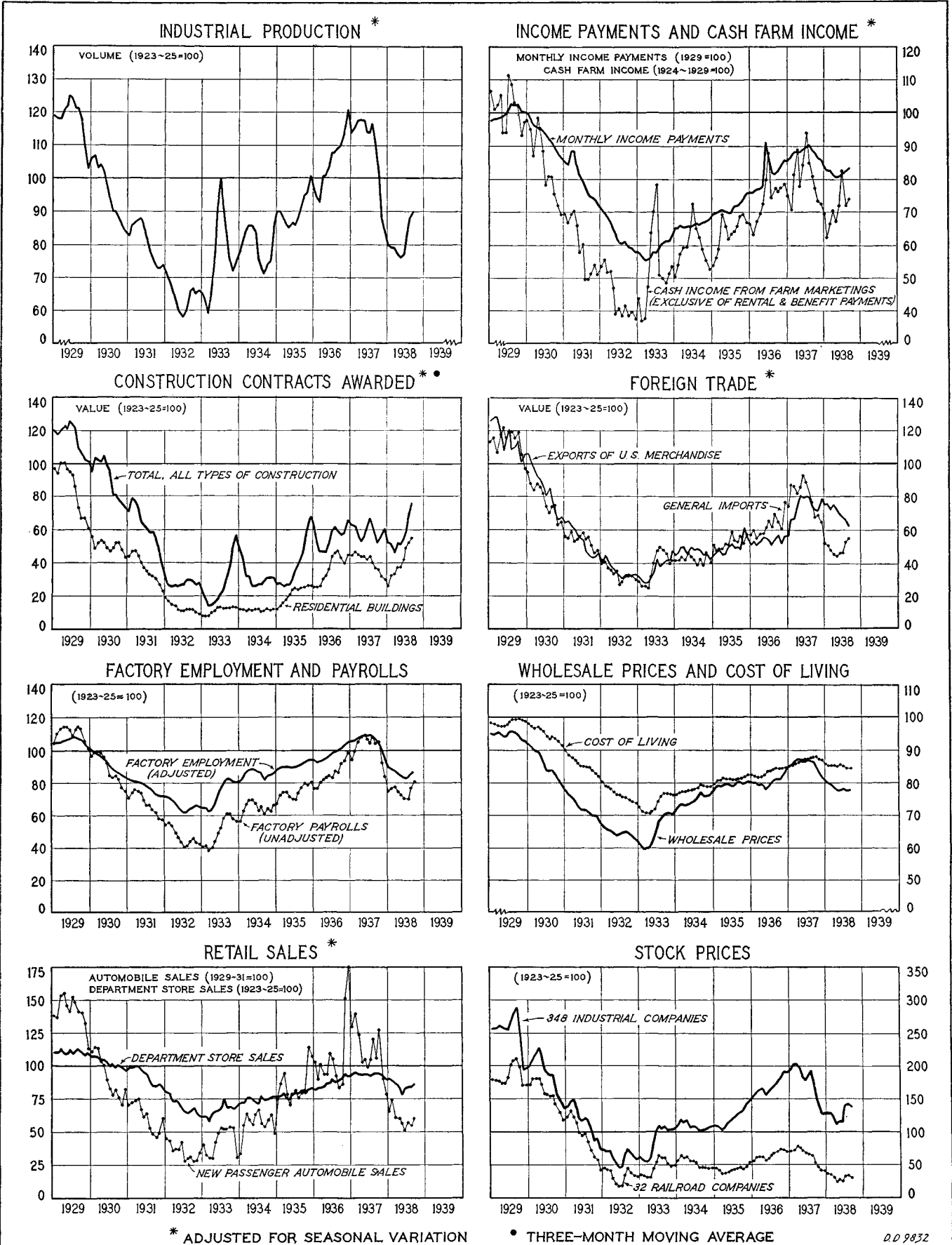
The omission of the special article in this issue was occasioned by the inclusion of the revised indexes of factory employment and pay rolls recently completed by the U. S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, and the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System. Because of the importance of these indexes, and the fact that the revisions were not completed in time to include the series in the 1938 Supplement, they are presented here in detail.

The table of weekly statistics, usually presented on page 21, is omitted from this issue and will not be carried in the future since all of the data in this table are published on page 2 of the weekly supplement to the Survey.

Business Situation Summarized

BUSINESS activity continued to move forward during October. The expansion in domestic production and sales and the lifting of war threats in Europe have been reflected in the rise in stock prices to the best levels of the year. The flow of capital through the new-issue market has been resumed on an enlarged scale as flotations held up during September were offered to investors. With the marked advance scored in industrial output during October, nearly half of the decline experienced in the 1937-38 recession has been recovered in a period of 4 months.

Expansion in manufacturing recently has been mainly in the durable-goods industries. A slackening in output on a seasonally corrected basis is indicated for

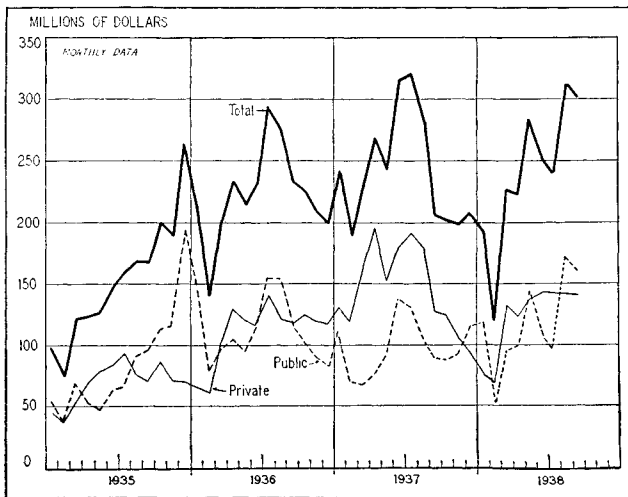


Figure 2.—Construction Contracts Awarded in 37 States East of the Rocky Mountains—Total, Public Ownership, and Private Ownership. Source of basic data: F. W. Dodge Corporation.

some of the industries producing goods in the nondurable classification. In September, all the major industries manufacturing durable goods, excepting the automobile industry, reported an increase in production. The automobile industry was engaged in the annual shift to new-model cars and produced about the same volume as in August. This industry has increased its output rapidly during October.

Steel production continued to rise during October, although some irregularity in the weekly rate of operations was induced by price changes during the month. Substantial reductions were made in the prices of certain important products, but before the end of the month prices were restored to the schedules prevailing prior to the cut. The rate of activity in October was in excess of 53 percent of ingot capacity, compared with a September rate of 45 percent. In the final week of the month ingot production moved above the rate in the corresponding week of 1937 for the first time this year.

Cotton manufacturing, which moved up rapidly during the summer months, is the major industry showing a decline on a seasonally adjusted basis. Cotton consumption in September increased but slightly, whereas a substantial seasonal gain is usual. Preliminary data for October indicate a further decline in the seasonally corrected index of cotton consumption. Silk consumption increased in September, while rayon production was maintained at the exceptionally high rate of the preceding months. Paper production in mid-October was at the rate of 83 percent of capacity, compared with a September average of 76 percent. Increased activity in the wearing apparel, carpet and rug, chemical, and rubber products industries was reflected in the employment and pay-roll data.

Income payments to individuals increased each month through the third quarter, with the seasonally corrected index for September recording an advance of 3.6 percent from the low reached in the second quarter.

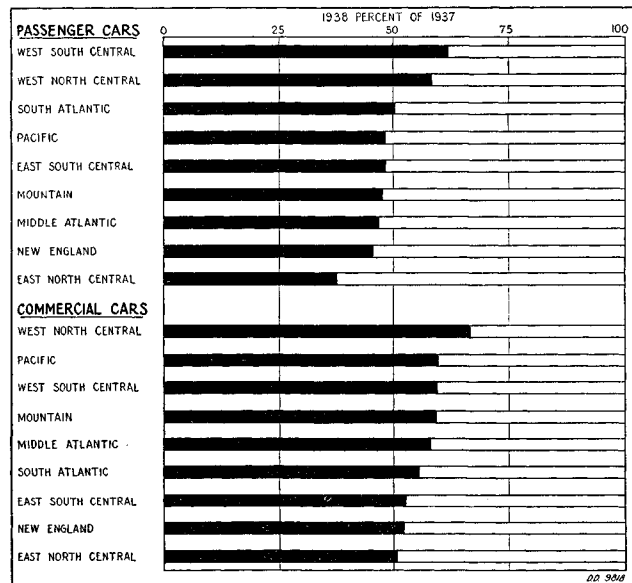


Figure 3.—Registrations of Passenger and Commercial Cars by Major Geographic Regions, 8 Months of 1938 Compared with Corresponding Period of 1937. Source of basic data: R. L. Polk & Co.

A further advance is indicated for October and if the present rate of improvement is maintained through the final quarter of the year, total income payments will show a decline from the 1937 results of less than 6 percent. When consideration is given to the moderate decline in the cost of living this year, it is apparent that the reduction in purchasing power derived from current income payments from 1937 to 1938 has not been marked.

The principal gains to date have been in the compensation of employees. While earnings of corpora-

tions have improved recently, the results of the third quarter, on the basis of statements published to date, were only moderately better than in the second quarter. Third-quarter profits were much lower than in the corresponding period of 1937.

While retail sales have been spotty, September results were better than in August. General merchandise sales of department stores and mail-order houses increased more than seasonally, and chain-store trade improved. Sales of automobiles were relatively low, but stocks of new cars have, in general, been liquidated. With large dealer orders for the 1939 models on hand, prospective manufacturing schedules of the industry for the last 2 months of the year have been increased.

Freight traffic expanded more than seasonally during September and October, with most major classes of traffic showing gains. Despite this improvement and the declining tendency a year ago, loadings in October were 10 percent less than in October 1937. The railroads have ordered sparingly of equipment. The class I carriers had on order less than 7,500 freight cars on October 1, and placed in service only 8,290 freight cars during the first 9 months of the year. Steam locomotives on order or under construction on October 1 numbered 14 as compared with 212 a year ago. Twenty-four electric and Diesel locomotives were on order, or four less than a year ago.

Revival in the construction industry continues to provide an important stimulus to current activity. Steady improvement in private residential building operations and the extensive public-works program have provided a rising volume of contracts. On a seasonally corrected basis, contracts have been advancing since last spring. The September Federal Reserve index of contracts awarded advanced to the highest point since 1931. The index of residential awards was above any figure since January 1930. Contracts awarded for commercial and industrial buildings have been in relatively small volume in recent months, but a number of important new industrial ventures were announced during October.

The accompanying chart indicates the trend of private and public building operations in recent years. Privately financed construction in September was 10 percent larger than a year ago, but the volume of publicly financed work was more than double.

Rising industrial and trade volumes have been accompanied by a substantial increase in the number of persons employed. The aggregate gain in employment in nonagricultural industries, as computed by the United States Department of Labor, amounted to 670,000 persons during August and September, and with reports from the major industrial centers indicating a continued upward trend, October is expected to bring a further increase in both employment and pay-roll distributions. On October 24, the Fair Labor Standards Act went into effect, and it was estimated by the

administrator of the act that the provisions would raise the pay of three-quarters of a million workers in

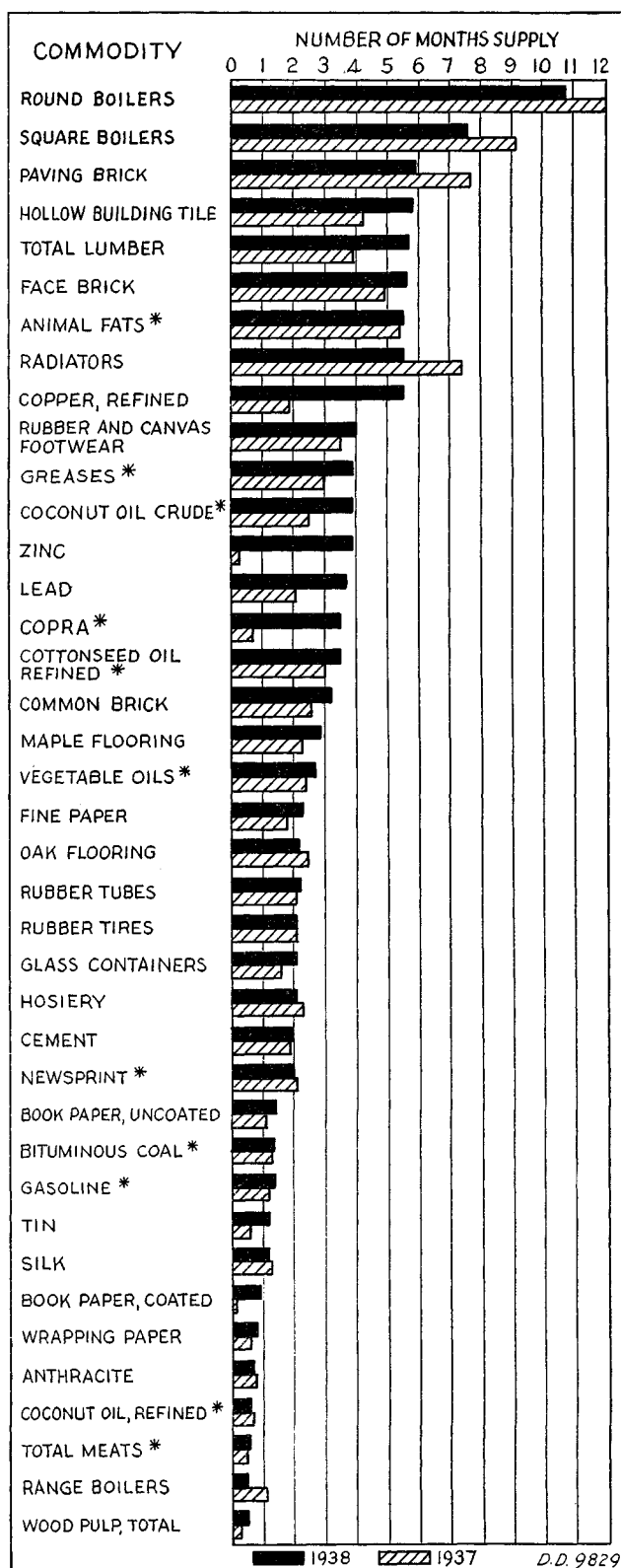


Figure 4. Ratio of Stocks to Consumption or Shipments.

the lowest brackets and would shorten the hours of approximately a million and a half workers.

Figure 3 shows the decline in passenger and commercial car registrations during the first 8 months of this year in comparison with the corresponding period of 1937. While substantial reductions were reported for both types of vehicles, it will be seen that the drop was more pronounced in passenger cars. Six of the nine areas reported decreases in excess of 50 percent and one—the East North Central area—recorded a drop of nearly two-thirds.

In the two preceding issues of the SURVEY, the inventory situation has been discussed on the basis of dollar figures. In order to appraise the relationship of quantity stocks of individual products with reference to the volume of consumption or the rate of factory shipments, a comparison for individual commodities for which current statistics are available was made and is presented in figure 4. For both 1937 and 1938 the ratio of stocks to shipments or consumption is presented in terms of months' supply, using the stock figures for the latest month available at the time the tabulation was made (most frequently August), and the average monthly figure of consumption or shipments for the 3 latest months. All of the figures used in preparing this chart are carried in the SURVEY each month.

Although the 3 months of 1938 for which average consumption or shipments were computed constituted a period of improving business, the general picture presented herewith would not be materially altered by the use of the figures for the latest month alone.

It should be borne in mind when reviewing the comparisons given that shipments or consumption for practically all items included were considerably smaller this year than in the months of 1937 used in computing last year's averages.

It is apparent that stocks at the end of the third quarter, while actually lower than a year ago in most instances, frequently were larger this year with regard to the current rate of consumption. While the ratios presented in the chart are based upon availability of data, rather than on the representativeness of the commodities, it can be seen that the stock ratio is higher for 27 of the 39 commodities presented and the same for 1. In some instances, the stock ratio is considerably higher than a year ago. For the items in the lower quarter of the chart, however, stocks of these commodities amounted to about a month's supply, or less. Building materials, with the exception of oak flooring and cement, fall in the upper half of this group. The finished consumers' goods are all in the lower half, with the raw materials scattered.

Commodity Prices

COMMODITY prices during October continued to display the relative stability that has been evident since mid-August. While some firming has occurred in prices of certain industrial raw materials, the general level of wholesale prices and also the average prices of "sensitive" commodities has not changed materially. Variations in Moody's index of 15 commodities since mid-August have been limited to the range of 142 to 145 (December 31, 1931=100). The recession in prices of leading farm products has been checked, but the index of this class of products in the third week of October was only slightly above the August lows.

Prices of industrial commodities have been firm generally, although weakness developed in some important products during October. Prices of crude oil were lowered in the first general change since January 1937. Quotations of refined petroleum products declined as a result of this change and the relatively high levels of refinery operations and stocks of refined products. Sulphur prices were reduced after having been held unchanged for a number of years. Sub-

stantial, though temporary, reductions occurred in prices of steel sheets and strips during the early part of October, and heavy purchases were reported to have been made by the automobile industry and other consumers prior to the withdrawal of the price concessions in the third week of the month. Prices of hides and nonferrous metals firmed. Copper for domestic delivery was advanced 1 cent per pound to 11¼ cents; export copper quotations moved upward in the early weeks of October but eased later as production restrictions on members of the international cartel were lifted. Prices of the new-model passenger cars were lowered moderately, canceling part of last year's advance.

Retail prices of department-store articles continued firm during September, according to the Fairchild index. This index has been unchanged since July, after declining from the recovery high of 96.6 early in the fall of 1937 to the present figure of 89.0, a loss of 8 percent. Retail food prices at mid-September were practically unchanged from the August level and were 8 percent below a year ago.

Domestic Trade

RETAIL trade increased at a more-than-seasonal rate during September. Department-store returns for the first 3 weeks of October indicate that sales were on about a par with September, although the usual seasonal change is toward higher figures. Temporary conditions apparently influenced the movement since consumer purchasing power has continued to rise. Reports of dealer orders for the new-model passenger automobiles indicated definite improvement in the sales prospects of automobile dealers, but the limited supply of 1939 model cars restricted actual sales during the month.

September sales of general merchandise showed improvement in most lines, and on the whole the gains were moderately in excess of the sharp rise which is customary at this period. For department stores the adjusted index increased 3 points to 86 (1923-25=100), and the index for sales of variety stores recorded a larger gain over August. Rural sales of general merchandise also expanded, as is customary at this season; but September sales were smaller than a year ago, whereas in August they were about even with those of August 1937. Retail sales have in general continued to make an improved showing in comparison with sales in the corresponding period of 1937 in many lines, although the results have not been uniform. Thus, for department stores a distinct narrowing of the margin

of loss from 1937 is apparent, while for variety stores the situation in September was about the same as in August. Rural sales, however, dropped below the September 1937 results, after having equalled the dollar volume of a year ago in August. On the other hand, this Bureau's sample of independent retail store sales, based upon reports from more than 18,000 retailers, has indicated a narrowing of the margin of loss from a year ago in each month since May. In September the decline in sales for this group, on a daily average basis amounted to 15 percent, as compared with 17 percent in August and 20 percent last May.

Dollar sales of 2,500 wholesalers reporting to the Bureau were about 14 percent larger in September than in August, on a daily average basis. Comparisons with a year ago recorded some further improvement, but total sales in September were about 13 percent lower than in September 1937. The inventory position of wholesalers has shown little change in recent months.

For manufacturers reporting dollar sales, daily average sales recorded about the same improvement over August as was reported for wholesalers and retailers. Comparisons with a year ago were more satisfactory for manufacturers, due mainly to the fact that the recession in business activity last fall was reflected in manufacturers' sales earlier than in the sales of either wholesalers or retailers.

Foreign Trade

EXPORT trade continued in relatively large volume in September, although the 7 percent gain in value over August was about half of the usual seasonal rise. As in several preceding months, the value of exports was somewhat smaller than in the corresponding month of 1937; the relative decrease in September was about the same as in August.

Agricultural exports in September valued at \$75,196,000 exceeded those of August by \$13,755,000. Larger shipments of meat products and fruits, as well as of cotton and tobacco, accounted for the increase. However, the value of unmanufactured cotton exports amounting to \$20,511,000 was an unusually low figure for September, and the quantity of cotton exported was less than in any September since 1922. This fact, together with the sharp drop in exports of grain (including flour) to less than \$11,000,000, in comparison with the large total of approximately \$20,000,000 in the previous month, held the rise in total exports below seasonal expectations.

The decline in exports of finished manufactures was not so pronounced during September as in the months immediately preceding. Exports of this class were valued at \$112,465,000, almost as large a total as in August. The trade in certain commodities which had dropped to lower levels in the two or three preceding

months—particularly in iron and steel manufactures, paper manufactures, and cotton manufactures—increased in September, while shipments of gasoline and industrial machinery, which had held at high totals through August, were lower in September.

Exports of semimanufactures increased to a value of over \$40,000,000 in September, after dropping from approximately \$46,000,000 in April to less than \$36,000,000 in August. Practically all exports in this class showed some increase in value in September.

Import trade was maintained in September at the improved rate attained in August. Reflecting the advance in industrial output in the United States, the value of crude material imports rose to the highest point of the year. While this increase was partly the result of the rise in certain commodity prices, notably in that of crude rubber, the major commodities in this class increased in volume.

Imports of semimanufactures as a whole were slightly smaller in value in September than in August. Imports of tin and wood pulp failed to reach as high a value as in August, while the value of diamonds, coal-tar products, and fertilizer imports increased. Finished manufactured imports increased slightly compared with August, and reached the highest monthly figure of this year.

Employment

THE number employed in nonagricultural industries in September rose to the highest level of the year, according to data compiled by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The gain over August amounted to about 450,000 workers, a more-than-seasonal increase. In September the number at work was about 2,700,000 less than a year ago whereas 3 months earlier the decline over the year interval amounted to 3,280,000 workers.

In manufacturing industries, the gain in employment in September was larger than usual, the adjusted index advancing 2 points to 87.0 (1923-25=100). The index has recorded a gain of about 6 percent since June, when the number of factory workers was at the lowest figure since 1934. Pay rolls also recorded a sharp gain in September, the index (without seasonal adjustment) advancing nearly 4 points to 80.7.

In contrast to the experience during July and August, when the recovery movement was gaining momentum, the increases in employment in September were more pronounced in the durable-goods industries. After adjustment for seasonal variations, this group showed a gain of about 5 percent, compared with an increase of less than 1 percent for the nondurable-goods group. Employment in the production of durable goods, how-

ever, is about 30 percent below the recovery high recorded in July 1937, whereas in the nondurable-goods lines, the number at work in September was only about 12 percent under the 1937 high, according to the seasonally adjusted figures.

The more-than-seasonal gain in employment in automobile plants accounted for an important part of the rise in the number at work in industries producing durable goods. Numerous other industries classed in this group, however, increased working forces by more than the usual seasonal amount.

Practically all of the nondurable-goods industries also reported increased employment, but in most instances the gains were of no more than seasonal proportions. Exceptions, in which more-than-seasonal improvement occurred, included wearing apparel, chemicals and allied products, and rubber products.

Gains also predominated among the nonmanufacturing industries in September as compared with August. Under the stimulus of seasonal influences and the improvement in general business conditions, retail trade establishments increased their working forces by about 184,000, a slightly more-than-seasonal gain. Mining industries generally reported improved employment conditions.

Finance

WITH the lifting of war threats in Europe, financial markets here and abroad strengthened. Stock prices on the New York Stock Exchange rose sharply after September 28, and corporate bond prices, which had been declining since the end of July, also moved higher. After the middle of October, prices tended to level off, but only after representative averages had advanced above the previous highs of the year established in the June-July movement.

Until the announcement, on September 28, of the four-power conference in Munich, speculative factors in security markets involved the discounting of the manifold influences which might arise from war conditions in general and from the application in the United States of far-reaching trade and neutrality legislation in particular. The possible effect on our export trade,

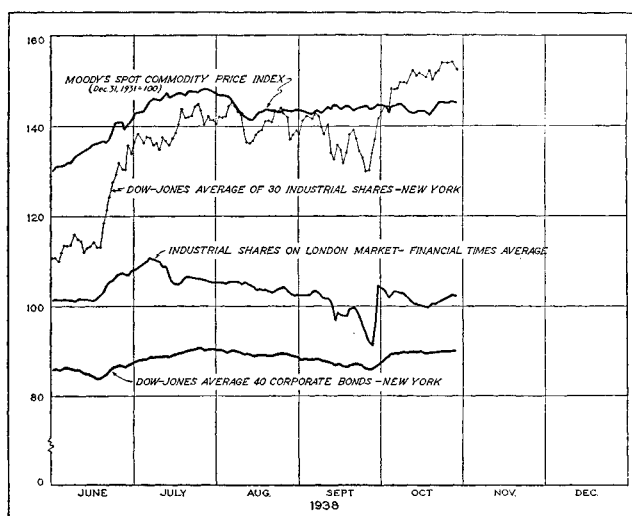


Figure 5.—Indexes of Security Prices on the London and New York Markets and Moody's Index of 15 commodities.

should the European tension develop into a general war, and the degree to which European belligerents could draw upon financial assets held in this country, permitted no clear-cut speculative course in the markets, with the result that both security prices and the foreign exchanges became all the more sensitive to the hour-by-hour cables from European capitals.

The repercussions of foreign political and financial developments have recently, as during the past 3 years, been definitely reflected in the course which foreign currencies followed in terms of the dollar. The impact of intermittent European crises has been mitigated by the operation of the various stabilization funds, with the result that the pronounced shocks produced during 1938—first by the crisis in March, which culminated in Austria's union with Germany, and, secondly, by the more dramatic events leading up to the Munich agreement—were absorbed without excessive disturb-

ance. The tension was nevertheless severe, as evidenced by the unprecedented flight of capital from European centers to the United States. Just prior to the announcement of the Munich Conference on September 28, sterling had fallen to \$4.60, the lowest point since October 1933. Although various other currencies fell to new low levels for recent years, the exchanges of the Netherlands, Switzerland, and Belgium held firm, and for the first time since July, when a period of European currency weakness set in, these currencies definitely broke their link with sterling.

Until the European political crises of September, the inward movement of capital funds during 1938 had

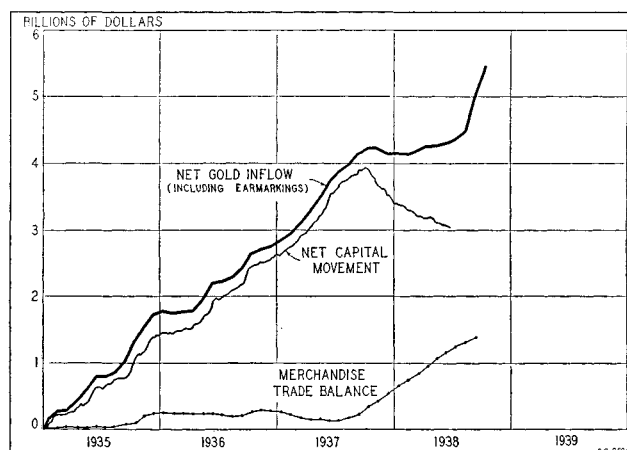


Figure 6.—Cumulative Net Movements of Gold and of Capital Between the United States and Foreign Countries, and Cumulative Excess of Merchandise Exports Over Imports Since January 1, 1935.

been confined largely to purchases of foreign dollar bonds in our markets in connection with redemption and sinking-fund operations. These purchases had been overshadowed during the first half of the year by a steady withdrawal of foreign-owned dollar balances from the United States, with the result that such balances were reduced from \$1,730,000,000 on December 29, 1937, to \$1,357,000,000 on June 29, 1938. During the same period short-term claims of banks in the United States on foreign banks increased from \$655,000,000 to \$711,000,000. Together with changes in international brokerage balances the reported capital movements during the first 6 months of 1938 resulted in a net outflow of funds aggregating \$578,000,000. These withdrawals were undoubtedly influenced in part by the merchandise export balance of \$631,000,000 in this country's foreign trade during the first half of 1938.

The developments in the international financial markets during recent months reveal sharp statistical contrasts as compared with the first 6 or 7 months of the year, even though financial difficulties in France had compelled a further depreciation of the franc in May

and the Austrian crisis several months previously had placed European currencies under heavy pressure. Gold imports, which had risen to \$166,000,000 in August, leaped to a new high record of \$521,000,000 in September. Since the Munich agreement the rate of outflow from Europe has gradually subsided, although more than \$500,000,000 in gold entered this country during the 4 weeks ended October 29. Although no data relating to capital movements since the middle of the year are available, it is apparent that the flight of foreign capital to the United States has materially lessened since the climactic event of September 28.

Despite the strength shown by foreign currencies after the Munich agreement, heavy selling again developed during the second week of October. The underlying influences are not clearly defined, but it may be noted that Europe has been subjected to a series of minor crises, while in this country the security markets have regained a forward momentum which, after having been definitely in evidence during July and part of August, had been reversed during September. The sterling rate has again dropped after recovering from the September low, but the current rate around \$4.75 is off 20 cents from the quotation in early July. The French franc has also tended lower during this period.

Quotations on foreign dollar bonds, notably Czechoslovak and other Central European issues, declined sharply during the critical weeks of September. With the turn of events assured by the agreement at Munich, foreign issues staged a spectacular recovery. The clearing of the foreign situation and the large supply of funds available for investment also produced a pronounced stimulus to the market for United States Government issues throughout late September and October.

In general, member-bank loans for commercial,

industrial, and agricultural purposes have remained on a comparatively uniform level since the middle of 1938, as compared with a decline of nearly \$700,000,000 during the first 6 months of the year. During part of this period the trend reflected in the reports from banks in New York and Chicago was in contrast with that reported by the banks in the remaining 99 of the 101 cities represented by the reporting institutions. In several instances banks outside the two big cities reported increases, which were offset in the aggregate figures by reductions reported by the banks in the two large financial centers.

The effect of the heavy gold imports since September is reflected in the rise in the estimated excess reserves of member banks, which were reported on October 19 at \$3,270,000,000, an increase of \$530,000,000 over the amount reported on September 21. During the same period gold certificates held by the Federal Reserve banks increased by \$301,000,000, although total Reserve bank credit showed a relatively small expansion.

Influenced partly by uncertainty arising from the European crisis, new corporate security issues fell in September below the levels of the 3 months immediately preceding. The volume of new financing for working capital, construction of plants, and purchase of equipment, however, during the third quarter of the year was larger than for any corresponding period since the second quarter of 1937. In view of proposed flotations definitely known to have been postponed because of the European crisis and owing to announced plans of several other important issues, it is probable that flotations during the final quarter will provide a favorable comparison with the July-September period. October flotations though mainly refunding issues showed a large increase over the September figures.

Construction

LARGER awards for residential building and public works were responsible for increased construction activity in the third quarter of 1938, compared with the first two quarters of this year and the corresponding quarter of 1937. Contracts awarded in the third quarter totaled \$854,000,000, according to the statistics compiled by the F. W. Dodge Corporation for 37 States, a gain of more than 5 percent over the third quarter of last year. In the first and second quarters of this year awards were 19 percent and 9 percent, respectively, below the totals for the corresponding periods of 1937. The similar comparison for residential construction is more favorable—the volume in the third quarter of 1938 advancing more than 30 percent over last year after dropping 33 percent lower in the first quarter and 15 percent lower in the second quarter.

For the first 9 months of this year, total contracts were only 7 percent below the value of contracts for the corresponding months of last year. Construction financed from public funds, however, has constituted a larger percentage of the total this year than in 1937. Publicly financed awards in the first 9 months of this year amounted to \$1,043,000,000, or 49 percent of total contracts, compared with 38 percent last year. In August, September, and the first half of October of this year, contracts financed from public funds

accounted for more than 50 percent of total awards.

An examination of the construction trend by geographic areas reveals that construction was more active during the elapsed 9 months of 1938 compared with the same months of the previous year in 4 of the 15 major areas included in the F. W. Dodge classification. Awards in the Texas area showed a gain of approximately 24 percent over last year, while the New England, Metropolitan New York, and St. Louis areas reported gains of less than 10 percent.

Residential building in September made further marked advances compared with the corresponding month of last year in the cities covered by the building permit data of the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The value of new residential building permits issued increased 55 percent over September 1937, and was less than 1 percent lower than in the preceding month. The new permits issued provided a total of 23,479 family-dwelling units, a slight increase over August, and a gain of 71 percent over the corresponding month of last year.

The building-permit data appear in the form of a time series in the SURVEY this month for the first time. On page 21 is presented a series of comparable data for 1,728 cities for which monthly data are available back to January 1936.

Monthly Business Statistics

The data here are a continuation of the statistical series published in the 1938 Supplement to the Survey of Current Business. That volume contains monthly data for the years 1934 to 1937, inclusive, and monthly averages for earlier years back to 1913 insofar as available; it also provides a description of each series, and references to sources of monthly figures prior to 1934. The 1938 supplement may be secured from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., for 40 cents per copy.

A few series have been added or revised since the 1938 Supplement went to press. These are indicated by an asterisk (*) for the new series and by a dagger (†) for the revised series. A brief footnote accompanying each of these series provides a reference to the source where the descriptive note may be found.

The terms "unadjusted" and "adjusted" used to designate index numbers refer to the adjustment for seasonal variations. Data subsequent to September will be found in the Weekly Supplement to the SURVEY.
